

We will include basic instructions, however, for accomplishing complex work such as a French Polish or intricate repairs, the customer's previous knowledge and expertise in working with traditional methods and materials is assumed. Need Rags?

Though we all laughingly say we have plenty of "rags", that isn't always necessarily true. Finding the ideal well-washed, lint-free, 100% cotton is many times a challenge.

We have found an ideal solution to be the "worn out" fabric from roll towel-dispensing machines.

Though these are not as readily available as they once were, we plan to try to have a supply available.

Since there is no way to predict cost and availability, if you are interested, ask for current details.

— Product Description —

APPLICATORS:

Sheepskin — A small piece of Sheepskin Wool is often a good applicator for *Antique Improver*. It works especially well when treating large or uneven areas. (If cleaning or smoothing is necessary, you will need a more aggressive applicator.)

Nylon non-abrasive pad — This "Teflon-safe" pad is more aggressive, but can be safely used, without scratching, when you need extra cleaning power on a delicate surface. Use with either *Antique Improver* or *Blemish Clarifier*.

Bronze Wool is not as harsh or cutting as the commonly-used Steel Wool, making it appropriate for the most delicate work. Also, small bits of the Bronze material are not as problematic when they inevitably become lodged in the wood grain. Even the finest flakes of Steel Wool might cause dark spotting — especially in oak. Bronze Wool is not impregnated with petrochemical oils as is Steel Wool.

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WE ARE NOT EXEMPT!

Though we wish we could "choose not to participate" in current unbridled escalation of costs and pricing overwhelming all areas of our lives, in the real world that just isn't possible.

Barely 30 days into our new Turpentine arrangement in 2006 there was a rate increase — and there have been more, not just on Turpentine but all ingredients and necessary materials.

Due to fuel costs, shipping rates are increasing rapidly. In spite of a newlynegotiated UPS rate, our cost—shipping only—to send one 8-oz. bottle 2 states away, is \$7.47. That leaves 3¢ of our \$7.50-per-order S&H to cover packing materials and labor. And, of course, the cost increases on larger orders to farther destinations.

It seems that almost daily there is some new cost to be "absorbed". This *is* the real world — for a company to remain in business, facts have to be faced.

Don't get alarmed — this is not a dreaded notice-of-price-increase. We simply want our customers to be aware that this is a constant concern for us and that we are doing all that we can to deal with rising costs and expenses by operating in a frugal and efficient manner — without ever sacrificing quality or changing our products in any way.

When the time comes that we need to make pricing changes we will, as always, make the announcement as soon as possible and hope that you will, as in the past, be understanding.

In the meantime, it is business-as-usual. We look forward to your orders — and don't forget to tell your friends — it all helps!

Stainless Steel Wool, is the opposite of Bronze Wool — *and is <u>more</u>* abrasive and <u>sharper</u> cutting than Steel Wool — making it beneficial on projects needing more aggressive cleaning and smoothing. As with the Bronze Wool, there is not the concern of darkening from embedded flecks, nor is it oil impregnated.

Cotton Webbing is used in upholstery, but can also be used as a non-abrasive furniture sling, as a protective wrap, or for many other uses in working with furniture restoration or in moving and storage. Very strong, 2-inch width.

SHOP STAPLES:

Beeswax, Rosin, Turpentine, Raw Linseed Oil, Castile Soap, Lye Soap, are all familiar materials. We offer them for your convenience in workable quantities and to ensure that you will be using products of the highest quality available.

PURE NATURAL DRY PIGMENTS:

Staining wood, as practiced today most often flows sythetic pigment in a syntheric carrier onto the wood surface as a thin paint wash — many times hiding the grain and leaving a "plastic", or artificial, look. Natural pigments, in natural carriers, work best when a change of color is necessary. Our pigments are of highest quality and can be used in conjunction with *Antique Improver* or *Blemish Clarifier*. They can also be mixed with other materials such as water, turpentine, alcohol, wax, hard stopping, putty, filler, etc. Any standard cabinet wood color can be matched with combinations of these eight colors: **Raw Umber, Burnt Umber, Raw Sienna, Burnt Sienna, Yellow Ochre, Van Dyke Brown, Titanium White, Carbon Black**.

SHELLAC:

Shellac, though it has lost popularity in recent years, is a very effective natural finish with many advantages. However, liquid shellac has a very limited shelf life — about a week. To obtain optimum results with shellac, it must be mixed from the flake (dry ground). Purchase in small amounts is many times difficult. We have packaged quantities of flake shellac in cans large enough to enable alcohol, in the necessary amount, to be added and the container then used for application and short-term storage. Choose from **Seed Lac, AC Garnet, Orange,** or **White**. Container sizes are 1/4 pt. 1/2 pt., 1 pt., 1 qt.

HIDE GLUE:

Ground (dry) Hide Glue is the best choice for furniture repair and many other uses. We offer a convenient kit that provides what you need to make the glue needed for your project. All you need to add is a heat source. (See story on Page 4).

ABRASIVES:

Pumice, Rottenstone, Whiting — in that order — are used for buffing, burnishing and adding lustre to wood and finishes. They are also used in making gesso, putty, filler, and more. We have included two grades of Pumice to add to flexibility.

Basic instructions for use are included with most items and more inclusive description and instructions will be available later on our Web Site. Some previous customer knowledge and expertise in working with traditional methods and materials is assumed.

THE KRAMER GLUE POT

John Kramer has long advocated hot Hide Glue as the absolute best choice when working in antique care and restoration. We have hesitated about offering it to our customers because its use would require the customer to obtain a glue pot, which for only occasional use on small projects, might

not be justified. As a solution, John has devised a very





workable unit using three round metal tins. Two of the tins are used as the pot and the third contains the glue granules. Also included in the kit are a brush for application and aspirins to retard spoilage — plus an instruction sheet. All you need to supply is a heat source. The 'pot' can be re-used many times and glue refills are available.
